#### [Fifth Meeting]

George Inn Aylesbury Thursday 18th October 1789

The Commissioners met pursuant to their last adjournment, and proceeded to hear Evidence in support of the claims objected to and also in support of the objections to the same.

The Commissioners according to Notice given perambulate the Boundarys of the Parish of Weston Turivlle.

the said Parish of Weston Turville from the adjoining Parishes of Aston Clinton and Halton and give Notice thereof to the parties interested, and report the same to the Commissioners at their next Meeting.

The Commissioners proceeded to complete their Valuation of the old Inclosures.

Ordered That the Clerk do affix the following Order upon the Church Door at Weston Turville on Sunday next.

# George Inn Aylesbury Thursday 18th. October 1798

The Commissioners met pursuant to their last adjournment and proceeded to hear Evidence in support of the claims objected to at the last Meeting, namely —

W<sup>m</sup>. Bates — In support of his claim to right of Common for 2 Cows 1 Bullock & 6 sheep admits that the Cottage when there was no land belonging to it had no right of Common but that by purchasing 3 ½ Acres of Land he became intitled, and has ever since enjoyed such Common right, altho' before he purchased the Land he occupied it as Tenant but never in respect of such occupancy thereof as Tenant claimed or enjoyed any Commonright as belonging thereto.

Conveyance from Henry Bates to  $W^m$ . Bates in Fee of a Close containing  $3^{1}/_{2}$  Acres in Weston Turville.

Dated 27th. & 28th. November 1792

M'. John Barker — Produces William Syster — Aged 88 — Says that the former owner of the Messe had Land belonging to it — and after he sold the Land he still stocked the Commons in respect of the Messuage. — Cottage rights allow<sup>d</sup>.

White Hart Inn Aylesbury Monday 10th. December 1798

The Commissioners met pursuant to their last adjournment and continued their Meeting until Saturday the 15th day of December instant.

In pursuance of an Order at the last Meeting M' Collisson reported that he had proceeded to set out the boundary line to divide the parish of Weston Tur. ville from the adjoining parishes of Aston Clinton and Halton.

Ordered That the consideration thereof be postponed.

The Commissioners having made the necessary calculations and adjusted the several proportions for allotting the properties to the respective proprietors and duly considered the several Claims for situation delivered in pursuance of the notice ordered at the last meeting, then proceeded to scheme the respective allot. ments.

 $^{Ordered}$  That the Surveyor do adjust and stake out the same by the  $8^{th}$ . day of January next according to the scheme marked out upon the plan.

them respectively that their allotments will be staked out ready for their inspection by Tuesday the 8th. day of January next And that the Commissioners will be ready to hear any objections that may be made to the same at their next Meeting at the White Hart Inn in Aylesbury on Thursday the 10th. day of January next in the forenoon.

That M'. Francis Purssell be appointed Surveyor for the making forming and compleating the Public roads and Highways.

Ordered That M'. Chaplin do collect the several Bills of expences and lay the same before the Commissioners at the next Meeting.

Adjourned to Wednesday the 9th, day of January next at this House.

### [Seventh Meeting]

White Hart Inn Aylesbury
January 9th, 1799

The Commissioners met pursuant to their last adjournment and continued their Meeting until and on Saturday the 12th. instant.

Several of the proprietors of Lands in Weston Turville by themselves or Agent attended this Meeting and the situation of their respective allotments having been pointed out to them by the Surveyor and no material objection being made thereto the Commissioners confirmed the several allotments nearby as they were ascertained and do hereby order that the Surveyor do stake out the

same with the utmost expedition.

The Commissioners took into consideration the boundary fencing necessary to be done on each Estate and alloted which sides and what particular parts there of should belong thereto.

Ordered That the Surveyor do as soon as he shall have ascertained and staked out the several allotments deliver to each Proprietor or their Agent a particular account of the quantity and value of their open field Estate and also of the old Inclosures retained after all the exchanges have been made and do likewise deliver to each proprietor or their Agent an account of the fencing directed to be done on each Estate to enable the several Proprietors to fence their respective allotments.

The Commissioners took into consideration the fencing allotted to each  $P_{r_0}$ -prietor and also the necessary Subdivision fences which should be done on each Estate.

That the Surveyor do apportion the quantity of fencing amongst the several Proprietors and ascertain what each Proprietor should pay or receive for having too little or too much fencing after the rate of 30 shillings per chain

The Commissioners took into consideration the several Bills of Expences incurred in obtaining the Act of Parliament and carrying the same into Excution.

Ordered That the Surveyor do make out a rate of the sum of forty five shillings in the pound value of each open field Estate and also the sum of ten shillings in the pound value of each old inclosed Estate exonerated from Tithes by Land And also the like sum of ten shillings in the pound value of each old inclosed Estate exonerated by a Corn rent And also the sum of three shillings in the pound value of each old inclosed Estate claiming to be exempted by a Modus.

That Mr Collisson do set a value on the several hedges standing on the respective allotments as boundary and Subdivision fences together with the trees growing thereon And also on the hedges growing and standing on the

several old Inclosures given and taken in Exchange with the trees growing therein and make out a stated Debtor and Creditor account thereof.

Proprietor has to pay towards the expences of the Act the Grass seeds the roads and the public fencing and for the inequality of fencing as well as for the hedges and trees bought and sold that he may be enabled to inform the Proprietors respectively what they have to pay.

That Mr Chaplin do on receiving such account write to the Proprietors to request them to pay their proportions to the Commissioners at their next Meeting on Wednesday the thirteenth of February at the George Inn in Aylesbury or if more convenient at any time previous thereto to Mr Chaplin at his Office in Aylesbury.

That all right of Common in over and upon the open and common fields common meadows and other commonable Lands within the parish of Weston Turville be from henceforth extinguished And that all Leases for a term of years or agreements at Rack Rent be vacated and do cease and become void from and after the 4th day of February next And that each and every tenant claiming to be entitled to a compensation for vacating such Leases or Agreements be prepared to state the same to the Commissioners at their Meeting to be held at the George Inn in Aylesbury on Thursday the 14th. of February next.

That the several occupiers of Lands within the parish of Weston Turville do give an account to the Surveyor of the time of their entry upon their respective Farms in order that the sums to be paid for rents of their Farms ending either at Lady day or Michaelmas last may be ascertained and settled by the Commissioners And that notice of this Order be affixed on the Church Door of the said parish on Sunday next.

That the Clerk do cause the notice to be prepared required by the Act of Parliament to be given that the boundary line set out by the Commissioners

to divide the parish of Weston Turville from the adjoining parishes of Aston Clinton and Halton will be deemed to be the boundary of the said parishes unless any person or persons shall appear before the said Commissioners on the 14th day of February next at the George Inn in Aylesbury and then and there show some reasonable objection to the course so set out and proposed for such boundary line and on which day the said Commissioners will be ready to hear all and any objection thereto.

Ordered That a Copy of the last Order be sent by M' Chaplin to M'. Hayton the Agent of General Lake and also to Sir John Dashwood King Bar'.

Adjourned to Tuesday the 12th day of February next the George Inn in Aylesbury.

The Commissioners then proceeded to give the necessary instruction to the Surveyor in order to make out the several sums of money to be paid by the Tenants to their respective Landlords for having held over various parts of their Farms beyond the time at which their several terms expired.

No objection having been made in consequence of the notice given in pursuance of the order at the last Meeting respecting the boundary line between the parish of Weston Turville and the parishes of Aston Clinton and Halton, the Commissioners do hereby confirm such boundary as now set out.

That M'. Collisson do forthwith make out a regular assessment for the payment of the Land Tax for the parish of Weston Turville according to the Quality price set by the Commissioners.

Ordered That the Surveyor do attend M' Chaplin and give the necessary instructions for the Award, and that a Draft thereof be prepared and laid before the Commissioners at their next Meeting.

The Commissioners having continued their Meeting until and on Saturday the 16th, instant, then adjourned the same to Wednesday the 27th, day of March next to be held at the Bell Inn in Aston Clinton.
